The Trust was established in 1974 to support the academic growth and scholarship of its members. Your individual and collective contributions to the Trust pay considerable and tangible dividends in that each grant helps to offset the rapidly escalating costs of members' pharmacy education. Over the past 35 years, grants awarded by the Trust have helped hundreds of members achieve their educational and leadership goals.

When I was a student, the Cora E. Craven Educational Grant helped me to pay my tuition and purchase books. I then pursued an advanced degree in pharmacology and began a career in academia. Today I have the great fortune to serve as dean of the College of Pharmacy and Health Sciences at Texas Southern University. I can say without hesitation that LKS and the LKS Educational Trust played a significant role in my personal and professional development. Because of such experiences, I have remained an active alumni member of LKS and give my time, talents, and treasure to help guide the efforts of the Trust.

To keep the Trust alive and growing for the benefit current and future LKS members, we depend on a combination of donations and prudent investments. Our Collegiate and Alumni chapters, Alumni-at-Large, and friends of LKS give generously every year to the Trust. Convention raffles and auctions, along with yearly fund-raising efforts by the Trust Liaison Committee make our educational grants program possible. Many chapters have special fund-raising efforts earmarked for the Trust.



In recent times, the term professionalism has had numerous connotations. Some believe it is the job preformed by an individual that establishes him or herself as a professional. Others believe that professionalism is based solely on appearance and the way an individual carries him or herself. Meanwhile, professionalism is actually a compilation of the aforementioned. The term is defined in the dictionary as the conduct, aim, or qualities that characterize or mark a profession. It is extremely pertinent to be wellrounded professionally, especially when it comes to a healthcare related career. Not only do you represent yourself and the knowledge you possess, but you also stand for your employer and all others involved in your line of work. Therefore, it is very important that professionalism be implemented at a young age in order to promise a future with unlimited success. In fact, implementing professionalism in individuals starting as early as high school would be beneficial in order to provide information as to what will be expected of each student in any field of practice.

This practice is actually being carried out within the Tau Chapter at Duquesne University in Pittsburgh, PA. Through a program entitled, "A Day in the Life of a Pharmacy Student", local

high school students interested in becoming a pharmacist are invited to spend a day on campus with members of Tau Chapter. Each student is given the opportunity to attend lectures, labs, recitations, and special presentations offered by the sisters. In this way, the high school students are introduced to the professionalism displayed within the classroom and within the organization as a whole. High school students are typically unaware of proper behavior for a classroom setting in a professional institution. Through this activity, these students are welcomed into a professional setting with no expectations, and are given the chance to learn how to respond to such situations. It is an enlightening experience for both the high school students and the sisters involved in the program. Through cooperation with the university and faculty, the program is becoming more successful as the years pass.

The feedback received from the students involved has been very positive. Many students do not know what happens during a typical day at a University. This is where the sisters step in and give each student the chance to ask any questions they may possess. In this manner, the students get a straight answer from individuals who are actually going through the pharmacy school program in a

professional institution. The questions range from why pharmacy school is a good choice to what dorm is the best to reside in. In fact, many find it hard to believe that one is not required to remain on campus all day, which is the atmosphere they are exposed to in high school. At the end of the day, a lot of the students find themselves wanting to come back. They get to leave campus possessing knowledge of how everything works, and are more prepared as to what will be expected of them in the future, whether they attend Duquesne University or another educational establishment.

In the future, we hope to include any high school student interested in attending college, and not just those intending to major in pharmacy. In this way, the sisters could help prepare a number of high school students for their journey into professionalism! Hopefully, we will be able to have several different dates for the event in order to accommodate more students. Professionalism is a full time job, and it is very important that students know what is expected of them from the very beginning. Through programs like, "A Day in the Life of a Pharmacy Student", high school students are able to get a jump start for the long road that lies before them.

Motions are proposals for action, beginning with, "I move we..."

A **Second** is required for the motion to be discussed.

Amendments may be made to most motions if they improve the intent or clarify the original motion.

Tabling lays the motion aside.

Calling the Question referes to ending the discussion and voting on the motion.

Voting is the official action after discussion to adopt, amend, kill or table the motion.

Minutes protect the organization by recording the time and location of the meeting, participants, and the outcome of the motions. They are not a place to record conversations, assignments, reports, etc.

Quorum is number of directors required to conduct business.
